A goodbye message from Mr Wycherley...

Back in 2002 I entered the west side reception and if I'm honest I was here for interview practice as I had my eyes on the teaching job in Chester the following week. However, there was something special about the school, its staff, and pupils that very quickly turned my interview practice into something very real. The staff came across as a real team on a journey working together to be the best it could be, but more importantly putting students at the centre of decisions and going that extra mile. The pupils were welcoming yet thrived off the excellent relationships (even laughing at some of my bad jokes) and were willing to try something a bit different in the classroom. It was clear to me that this was a school that I definitely wanted to be part of. My wish came true and nearly 20 years later these principles still exist and I truly believe that these principles make OWS an exceptional school to study and work at.

Throughout my teaching career I always wanted to make a difference. This is my main reason for teaching and still is my main motivation today. Looking back with some geography bias I'm sure that I have done this with many pupils pursuing all sorts of geography related careers. Some even went on to become geography teachers!

There is an old saying: 'the time flies when you're having fun,' and I have no doubt thoroughly enjoyed my time at OWS, and I have so many great memories of pupils and staff, both past and present.

Geography has taken me to many amazing places - Iceland, Milan, the French Alps, North Wales, Llangollen, Hay on Wye, Shrewsbury and of course Carding Mill Valley. These have been great opportunities but what I will always remember is the way OWS students represented themselves. Frequently I would receive comments on how the pupils have been so engaged, polite sometimes funny and a pleasure to teach. It is great when somebody else experiences what I have done over my years here. I will miss this and can really say I've enjoyed teaching geography.

I must also say a massive thank you to the staff. To those who took me under their wings and mentored me through the first few years of my career thank you for all your advice. This has helped me today and I now find myself in the position of Deputy Head and I have drawn on that advice. I now find myself in the role of the mentor rather than the mentee. Without the support of my colleagues, I simply would not be where I am today, and I can't thank them



enough.

Being responsible for quality of education provides me with a unique opportunity to watch lessons across the school and this is never failed to impress me as I see the experiences young people receive at this school. However, it is not just the teaching staff. I've been supported by a great admin team, teaching assistants and of course the site team, who over the years I've had to do some great jobs for me. This includes more than once removing a shoe off the roof or rescuing a bird from a classroom.

I leave to become an Education Manager working in outdoor education across the UK. This allows me to continue to deliver geographical education and have an impact in a new setting. I kind of move from a great classroom at OWS to the best classroom in the world 'the Outdoors' which allows me to bring geography to life in some stunning locations across the whole of the UK. I leave with many mixed emotions as I will miss Oldbury greatly, but I'm also excited about my new opportunities.

May I finally also thank parents and students for your support over the many years.

Assemblies Behaviour

During assemblies last week, pupils and staff have been reminded about OWS Expectations. Pupils have been instructed that staff are focusing on the following things:

- Punctuality to school and to lessons – Pupils who are late more than once will be put into a HOY afterschool detention. We will be notifying parents via text message.
- Following instructions given by staff first time
- Respecting the learning of others – by not calling out

Physics

Oxford Uni Physics Trip

A group of year 9 students took part in a physics event at Oxford university on 31st March. The day comprised of 3 workshops, Superconductors, physics of toys and chemical clocks.



In the Superconductors workshop the students cooled a special ceramic to -200 deg C using liquid nitrogen. At this super cool temperature the ceramic became a superconductor and the students investigated its magnetic properties.

In the 'physics of toys' workshop the students demonstrated their knowledge of the scientific method and were able to plan investigations to determine the physics behind mirrors, heat transfers, rotating objects and electrostatics.

The final workshop 'chemical clocks' the students were given 3 different clear liquids which when mixed, produced an opaque liquid after a certain amount of time. Their task was to experiment to find the correct mixture so that the liquid changed colour after exactly 45 seconds. One group managed to change theirs in 47 seconds which was much closer than their teachers 57 second attempt.

The day finished with a science show all about particle accelerators, charting their history, their uses in medical treatments and what the future holds for them.

The girls were amazing and the feedback from the scientists at Oxford University at how impressed they were with them shows we have some physicists of the future.

Year 7 Idioms Competition

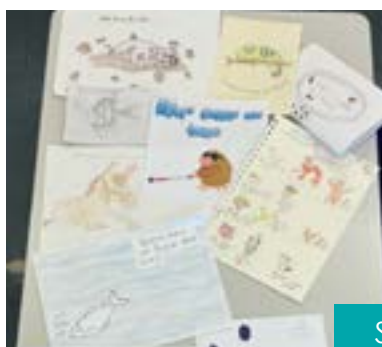
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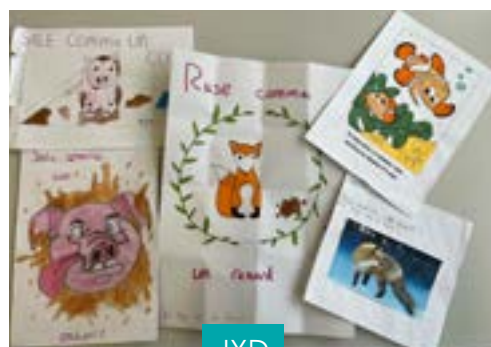

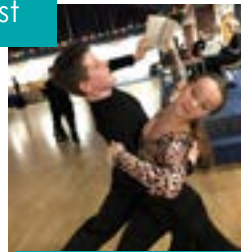
Extreme Read Competition
