Benefits of competing in the 'Poetry By Heart' competition include: increasing confidence, practising speaking skills, developing memory skills, knowing and exploring great poems, engaging on a deeper level with English and just having fun. Therefore, I was extremely pleased that some of our students chose to be involved. Our KS4 'Classic' winner, Maisie Rollings, won the 'Best in the County' award, defeating students from a range of Shropshire schools, which was fantastic. The KS4 and KS3 'Freestyle' winners (Y10: Aggie Thompson, Ella Quinton and Ellowyne Broadhouse, and Y8: Grace Faulkner, Annabelle Stringer and Eden Tudge) all achieved 'Highly Commended', which means they almost made it to the same level as Maisie. Well done to all of them!

The trip to the Globe Theatre was a pure celebration of poetry. We heard the finalists for KS2, 3, 4 and 5, as well as poetry readings from Simon Armitage (Poet Laureate) and Joseph Coelho (Children's Poet Laureate). It was also lovely to be a part of the awards ceremony of the

national winners from the four key stage groups. Although, interestingly, we didn't always agree with the chosen winners, which caused a debate amongst ourselves.

It was a lovely experience to organise the 'Poetry By Heart' competition and witness the confidence and techniques of the competitors increase over the year. It is always a joy to go to the Globe Theatre and share the opportunity with students.

# **Creative Writing Workshops**

Links with Manchester Metropolitan University

Throughout this school year, Oldbury Wells' English Department has been working on a project with two professors (Chris Hanley and David Cooper) from Manchester Metropolitan University, where the focus is on the natural world, particularly trees and their importance to the world around us. The name of the project is 'Voices of the Future', which is all about exploring students' awareness of their place in the world, different perspectives and ability to develop their English skills, whilst exploring a topic (the natural world) that impacts on their life and surroundings. There are several schools in the North that are associated with the project, and we are the only school in Shropshire to also take part.

All of Year 9 have been involved and as a school, we have designed a unit of work called 'Place' to allow students to work creatively on Shropshire and narrowing this down to Bridgnorth. The students have been using a variety of different types of writing, from historical, poetry, informative, narrative and descriptive, all to develop their understanding of 'place' and their response to this. There have also been a variety of different activities to support the development of their writing.

One of the activities consisted of students participating in a creative writing workshop in July that took place both in a classroom and outside in the copse, adjacent to the playing field. There were three workshops a day working with twenty Year 9 students in each one. The Wednesday groups, working with Shropshire author Kate Innes, focused on perspective and the students had to create a piece of writing which considered different perspectives within the setting of the copse. The Thursday groups, working with Shropshire writer and lecturer Paul Evans, focused on zooming in on the small, less noticeable objects and bringing them to life through investigating their place in the bigger picture of the setting.

After a curious start from all groups, the students began to find their confidence and creative voice through the guidance of the visiting writers and professors. Even Oldbury Wells' Science Department helped, as they loaned us their magnifying glasses to help investigate the copse! The work produced was beautifully varied and allowed the students to explore the natural world in a way that was different from anything they've done before. The workshops were a great success.

Oldbury Wells, and the English Department, will be acknowledged in the research developed from this project. Furthermore, some of the work produced by the students will eventually be a part of an anthology of creative pieces and will be published. The department is looking forward to reading these and observing what our students are capable of.


#### **KS3 Science Club**

# History and Global Citizenship


A year in History!

As part of the theme 'The Fragility of Freedom' students remembered the Kindertransport that saved the lives of children like Vera Lowyova from Nazi persecution.




# March: International Women's Day and Warwick Castle






Taking place for the 3rd time in Paris & will be the biggest event ever organised in France.



# Year 7 D&T - Mug Design Project

Talent throughout all aspects of D&T

This year in D&T, Year 7 pupils have been given the opportunity to design their own decorative mugs, showcasing their creative skills by designing either a pattern or a scene in their sketchbooks, followed by digitising their design proposal and using Photoshop to create their final image in vibrant colour. This could then be permanently transferred onto a ceramic mug by using dye sublimation printing followed by heat pressing.

Pupils were tasked with creating a range of designs and asked to select their favourite based on how much they liked it, but also to consider any potentially wider appeal that could effectively make their mug design a commercially viable business proposition.



As such, pupils responded with individual and exciting design work that interested both them and their peers but was also not overly personalised to keep the levels of interest from a range of people high. Pupils were also informed that their designs could be used for a competition entry and staff would choose the Oldbury Wells Mugs of the Year.

Special mentions go to Georgina Harman, Elisa Roggenbach, Bradley Masefield and Lily Lloydbottom for their excellent designs this year, amongst many others of course!

Due to all of the excellent work across Year 7, deciding upon our winners was very difficult! Ultimately, four pupils were shortlisted: **Betty Ravenhall**, for her heart themed mug (the strongest visual pattern design), **Max Whiteman**, for his wonderful coastal village seascape, and the dynamic duo of **Holly-Ann Glaze** and **Ruby-Rose Mould** for their extraterrestrial themed intergalactic designs.



All four received a tote bag printed by Miss Roden (whom all pupils also thanked for helping them to print their final mugs) with their winning designs on.

Ultimately, if I had to choose only two mugs as the official Oldbury Wells Mugs of 2024, I would possibly go with Holly-Ann's and Max's designs, but it really is almost impossible to choose between them!

On Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup> July, a group of talented Year 8 girls had the unique opportunity to explore RAF Cosford and participate in a computing challenge. The visit is part of 'I Belong', an initiative organised by the National Centre for Computing Education (NCCE) and STEM Learning, aimed to inspire the next generation of girls in computing.

RAF Cosford, known for its cutting-edge aviation technology and training, proved to be the perfect setting for this educational expedition. The day began with a tour of the Aerospace Museum, where the girls marvelled at the historic aircraft and learned about the evolution of aviation technology. From early biplanes to modern jets, the intricate blend of engineering and computing was evident at every turn.

Following the tour, students took part in a workshop where they harnessed the power of the Micro:Bit to program buggies for an expedition on Mars. These small yet powerful computers enable students to control the motors of their buggies, bringing their code to life and providing them with hands-on experience in robotics and programming. The workshop demonstrates the potential of STEM education to inspire and equip future engineers and computer scientists for the challenges of interplanetary missions.

The trip to RAF Cosford was more than just an educational outing; it was a transformative experience that ignited a spark of curiosity and ambition. Throughout the visit, the message was clear: computing skills are not only essential, but also incredibly empowering. The girls were encouraged to see themselves as future innovators and problem solvers. The visit provided invaluable insight into the critical role of computing in aviation and encouraged these bright minds to pursue their studies in computing.

#### Frictionless Futures

#### Price Waterhouse Coopers

A group of 17 of our Year 10 students have been taking part in a pilot project with Pricewaterhouse Coopers and Shropshire Council. Oldbury Wells School and Lakelands School in Ellesmere were the two schools selected to take part.









As part of the project, we visited Pricewaterhouse Coopers office in Manchester. The focus of the visit was to look at how digital technology is used in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. They learnt about 'Frictionless Futures' – how AI technology is used in retail and sporting venues. They also got to learn about the use of VR headsets. They had the opportunity to try these out - there was some great virtual dancing and boxing.

They experienced what life was like in a major corporate office, including using their table tennis tables and table football. We were also lucky enough to experience the roof terrace which afforded an excellent view across the Manchester skyline.

Finally, the students had to work in groups and to create a presentation about how they would use AI. The two speakers delivered their ideas.

The final celebration event took place at Shrewsbury Town football club. A group of our students, Izzabelle Evans, Dylan Thompson, Freya Turford, Halle Morgan and Conor Galley won the competition for the best presentation. Our students took part in a careers fair with many local employers, apprenticeship providers and local colleges.

All students involved have been excellent in all parts of the programme. The staff at PwC and Shropshire Council have praised how well our students have engaged. A big well done to all involved.


