TrustEd Parliament 'Goes Green'

Therefore, each school has been provided 4 large recycling bins for the different waste:

- General waste
- Mixed dry recycling
- Paper and cardboard
- Food waste

Thanks to the commitment of all involved, each school will also have smaller bins for the same separate waste that staff and students will be expected to use.

Pupils in all of our schools have been part of assemblies about their role in helping the environment by separating their waste and to help them understand what is allowed in each bin. The Student Parliament from each school will be placing posters in corridors.

Several of our schools have also received education on 'Earth Day', which was on 22nd April 2025. Earth Day aims to remind us of the importance of sustainability (looking after the planet well now and for future generations) and conservation (protecting natural ecosystems).

Earth Day 2025 specifically is focusing on reducing pollution (especially plastic pollution), renewable energy, and taking better care of our wonderful planet, so the timing of this really helped the Parliament's drive on recycling.

TrustEd Sports Alliance

Spring term 2025 has been another jam packed; fun filled term for the Trusted Sports Alliance (TSA) team! Our programme has involved the following:

PE teaching:

The TSA team of 10 deliver high quality PE lessons for early years, KS1 and KS2 pupils across 28 primary schools in east, south and central Shropshire. Primary schools select a service for ½ day p/week or a full day p/week of teaching from a qualified PE specialist through TSA to deliver all aspects of the curriculum from dodgeball to gymnastics and everything in between.

Teaching staff also support schools by delivering after-school provision, leadership training and staff training whilst in each school across the year.

Leadership Training:

TSA staff deliver sports leadership training to primary and secondary schools across over 60 schools in all 3 geographical areas. In primary schools this involves staff delivering 'Playleader', 'Bronze Ambassador' or 'Leadership Academy' opportunities for upper KS2 pupils. This training equips pupils with the necessary leadership skills and qualities such as organisation, communication, teamwork to deliver multi-sport activities at lunch/break times and plan, organise and run mini-intra-school competitions across the year.

In secondary schools this training consists of training secondary students in KS3 and 4 to be able to volunteer supporting primary school competitions and festivals at secondary sites across the year. In many cases, this also involves students receiving an official qualification through the Leadership Skills Foundation Level 1 Qualification.

Staff training

The TSA team plan and deliver a large-scale programme of staff training for primary and secondary staff across the year. Some training takes place on school sites such as whole school CPD for primary staff covering aspects such as educational gymnastics, swimming according to each school's needs or larger centrally coordinated training such as School Games Mark application training for PE leads. TSA have also delivered training suitable for secondary staff such as RFU T1 rugby – the RFU's new version of touch/semicontact rugby and LUSU training for staff working with young people with physical needs in PE.

Competitions, events and festivals!

Across each calendar year TSA plan and manage 7 different primary school event calendars across different geographical areas in south, east and central Shropshire. Each calendar consists of 20 – 45 events across the year including events which target certain groups of young people such as Inclusion events and SEND specific events through to more competitive events which link into the county School Games Programme. Primary schools can choose to attend whatever events they choose in line with their level of service. Events cover an extremely broad menu of activities from orienteering to football and everything in between!

TSA also manage a calendar of secondary events across all 3 areas targeting KS3 and KS4 students with many of these also linking into the county School Games Programme.
