OWS Athletics Success Year 7 & 8



A squad of Year 7 and 8 students took part in a District Year 7/8 athletics competition hosted at William Brookes School on Tuesday 16th May. The participants competed in a range of track and field events, from hurdles to 800m and long jump to discus, to gain points for their respective boys' and girls' teams. Some really strong performances for the girls' team resulted in 1st place for Immy Leith in 200m, Harriet Haden in 800m, Macev Hand in long jump and high jump and Millie Fretwell in javelin. In addition to these, Harriet Haden also came 2nd in shot and the relay team of Millie, Immy, Lucy Courtman and Nyrah Khalil finished in silver medal position. This, plus other solid performances put the

girls in overall 1st position, 6 points ahead of their nearest competitors who were Ludlow. In the boy's competition there were also some 2nd positions earned by Charlie Hadley in long jump, Alex Foster in high jump and Fabio Pace in javelin. The boys finished in overall 3rd place. Well done to everyone who took part.
