



St. Mary's Creative Writing Workshop

On Thursday 6th July, ten Year 9 students attended and co-led a creative writing workshop at St Mary's Bluecoat C. of E. Primary School.

Each Year 9 has been selected to be an 'English Ambassador' and I will be working with them over the next two years to develop their skills and confidence to reach their full potentials and promote English throughout our community. This will take the form of taking part in competitions, going on trips, being part of clubs, supporting younger students, having ownership of aspects of the subject and working with primary schools. St Mary's is the first primary we have worked with, and it was a fantastic success for both schools.

During this visit to St Mary's, each 'Ambassador' mentored two Year 5 students. The criteria were to develop the detail of descriptions and use of sentence structure within the writing of the Year 5s. However, the actual task was for each Year 5 student to write a biography of the Year 9 mentoring them. This meant the Year 9s were being constantly asked questions and they had to guide their mentee to select the relevant information. We were discovering the dancers, rugby and football players, swimmers, skiers, writers, and sailors (!) amongst the Year 9s. It was actually really fascinating for me to learn about the hidden depths of my students!

The 'English Ambassadors' were fabulous. They showed great English skill with SPaG and sentence structure and had an infinite amount patience with their young charges. The Year 5s were also a joy to work with, as they were inquisitive and determined to learn all they could from the visiting Year 9s.

Myself, Mrs Compson-Lea (St Mary's Headteacher) and Mr Taylor (Year 5 teacher) were all incredible impressed with everyone involved and we all agreed just how much our students got out of this opportunity. Personally, I was extremely proud of their conduct, academic knowledge and enthusiasm throughout the morning. We're now looking forward to working with St Mary's next year and with even more opportunities for the 'Ambassadors' to be a part of.



WWI Residential Trip Diary

Day One



(10th July 2023) Our World War I battlefield visit to Ypres and the Somme got off to a cracking start with everyone ready bright and early and raring to go. On this visit we will be investigating how World War I is remembered today and what it means to 21st Century students. No blue birds over the white cliffs of Dover as we sailed across the channel but no one minded as there was plenty of sun. After a Belgian meal at our lovely chateau style hotel we are all looking forward to a history packed day tomorrow.





Day Two



(11th July 2023) Wow! What a day. Amazing historical sites, excellent interaction with them and lots of super memories. Today we have been exploring the experience of soldiers in the Ypres area. The day began with Essex Farm cemetery; birth place of one of the most famous poems of the war, site of a field dressing station and forever associated with the poppy. Every soldier's home away from home- Talbot House, moved and inspired in equally measure. How countries choose to remember the Great War was a hotly debated issue at the German Cemetery at Langemark, as well as the colossal British cemetery at Tyne Cott. The restored trench network

was fascinating for all at Sanctuary Wood. All students conducted themselves in a manner they could be proud of but only two could place the wreath at the Menin Gate during the Last Post ceremony and that honour fell to Sam Ward and Olivia Burrows who represented the school so very well.





Day Three



(12th July 2023) Today we moved on from Belgium to France to investigate how World War I developed. Our underground guides brought to life Wellington Quarry and the experiences of British Empire soldiers who tunnelled beneath Arras in 1917, in an attempt to push back the German lines. The rest of the day was focused on key sites from 1916 and the infamous Battle of the Somme. The Lochnager Crater brought to life the destructive firepower of the first day of the Somme. Students marvelled that so many family names could be found on the memorial to the missing at Thiepval. The day came to and end with a walk across

the battlefield at Newfoundland Park. Another day of more history adventures and superb commitment from OWS students.





Day Four



(13th July 2023) On our final day we just had enough time for a cultural (and chocolate!) visit to Bruges. We even got chance to sneak in one more historic experience, a view of Michelangelo's Renaissance masterpiece - the Bruges Madonna. The guides there summoned up well the tone that our students have struck all week, by thanking the group for their respectful approach. What a team our 2023 group have been!



Little Astronauts everywhere

Year 5 Art Space Workshop



Students from Broseley looked at Space through the eyes of artists. Van Gogh's Starry Night with Venus a focal point, Kandinsky's abstract planet shaped formed paintings and Moonwalk by Andy Warhol which celebrates the historic Moon landing of July 1969, when Apollo 11 commander Neil Armstrong and 'Buzz' Aldrin became the first human beings to step on another world. We started by experimenting with different media to illustrate images associated with Space.

Their final task was to imagine they were astronauts in space like Armstrong and Aldrin and to visualise what they could see through the helmet visor using their own imagination and inspiration from the artists we studied. The Year 5 students were amazing and produced a wide range of astronaut helmets to make some creative and experimental ideas as you can see here. At the end of their Art mission in Space the students were awarded with special Nasa badges made by Miss Roden in D&T as a memento of their experience.

Thanks to Sophie Rafferty, Josie Burt, Merab Walker and Anya Sarpal from year 9 who created some amazing astronaut helmets based on Dr Who and different space scenes to inspire the Year 5s.

Change of school end of day finish

From September 2023, the Government have stated that mainstream schools should deliver a school week of not less than 32.5 hours. As previously communicated, from the start of next academic year, our school day will continue to formally start at 8:45am (with students expected on site by 8:40am) and will now finish at 3:15pm rather than 3:05pm. The extra 10 minutes will support an extended morning tutor time to continue to strengthen our strong personal development program, alongside adding 5 minutes onto our lunch time to ensure that student have extended time for a break and to join in any lunch time activities. All transport times will be adjusted in the afternoon by 10 mins to take this into account.

School Uniform

As we look towards September, we ask parents for their support with regards to school uniform. We know that over the summer many items of uniform are updated, parents should refer to the school website which gives clear guidance on uniform requirements (https:// <u>www.oldburywells.com/parentguardian-information/uniform</u>).
